



On May 19, 2017, the “Last Bell” rang for the graduates of the Georgian public schools. They were dressed in similar clothing, gave emotional farewell speech, and performed joyful songs and beautiful dances, thanks to the joint efforts of the Educational Department Director, Eugenia Markosyan, and teachers Metaksia Ghazaryan, Oksana Sharoyan, Mari Abulyan.
